

Bump was my friend and at times my teacher, my rock and my audience. I remember drinking with him before he got sober. I witnessed him getting sober and the struggles



he told me about, meeting in the rooms of AA back in Creswell in the old library as I got sober too, I didn't stay and Bump did. I came back into the rooms of AA in Creswell and there was Bump welcoming me back into the rooms. He told me to attend the meeting after the meeting, which I did.

I remember after a time telling him "I'm starting to understand the pink cloud everyone talks about", his reply was "this too shall pass" with a smile on his face! I wanted to tackle him!

I lost my father 62 days after getting sober and he told me to sit on my hands and keep the plug in the jug to stay sober and take it nanosecond by nanosecond. I did and stayed sober.

I had hired him to do electrical work, we talked AA for days, he would play my guitar and explain AA in ways I could understand and I stayed sober. Bump was always available as a friend and co sponsor, his home group was the Creswell meeting on Monday which I attended as well. We and a few others celebrated AA birthdays in January, very large and well attended where at closing he would read from his book of all the AA's that had passed sober, always very moving, my dad's name was on that list!

Bump taught me about breaking down the steps, welcoming the newcomer, the importance of reading the Big Book and importance of service. He was a man who talked the talk and walked the walk always giving credit to the program of AA.

Today I have sponsees that talk Bump's words back to me and I'm forever reminded of the AA circle of love which is never ending. Bump passed with 39 years sober and I miss him!

Rest easy Big guy, until we meet again, a hui ho!

There was the story about the "Go Go Girls" at the Cougar Room up the McKenzie River, and how he, um, lost his dinner on the cop's shoes after being pulled over on the way home and then realized, "He was one of my patients!"

There was the one about his once sitting on John Wayne's lap at some talent show in the late 1940s where he auditioned. True story. Yep, Bill M. was once a tap dancer and, apparently, a damn good one. No one in his home group was really surprised by that. We all knew that Bill was a world-class runner during his college days in Montana, that set world age-group running records at Hayward Field in his 50s. God knows he reminded us time and time again.

And, of course, there was the "Monkey Story," a wild tale about Bill's first drinking experience at 18 in which a monkey not only ripped out of his hand Bill's beer, but took a part of his right breast with it!

If you never got to hear it, well, we're sorry.

It was a doozy.

But if, in the beginning, the goal is to stay sober "One Day at a Time," the ultimate goal is to die sober, right?

And "Wild Bill," as some of us called him, did just that, passing away at his Eugene retirement home on April 6 at the age of 91 and, much more importantly, with almost 48 years of sobriety.

He would have called that a "good start."

A self-described "tongue-chewin" drunk, Bill walked into his first AA meeting in May 1972 hoping to just "taper down."

The older-timers, at what was known then as the Business and Professional Group meeting in Eugene, just chuckled, of course. And Bill, small in stature but large in appetite, not only tapered down his prodigious beer drinking, he kept coming back, never to drink again.

Not even when Tom, the eldest of his and beloved wife Marcia's four standout distancerunning sons, died at age 31 when hit by a car in Los Angeles in 1986.

Not even when Billy, son no. 3 and still the holder of the University of Oregon's 5,000-meter record and a 1980 Olympian, incomprehensively suffered the same fate, killed in 1992 in a car crash on the Oregon Coast at age 33.

Can you imagine? Losing not one, but two sons?

"You just keep going on," Bill once said. "What other choice do you have?"

Today, what was Bill's home group for almost five decades is called "It's a Doozy" in honor of Bill. It's a step-study meeting at the Emerald Community Fellowship church at East 19th Avenue and Patterson Street, and it became a longtime tradition that Bill would end the meeting with: "We've got a meeting here next week, it's on the (fill in the blank) Step. Come and hear it — it's a doozy."

We still say that. We'll always say that.

We all laughed, time and again, no matter how many times we heard it when he'd rise from his seat and announce, "My name's Bill. And I'm an alco-loony." He should have registered that as a trademark.

AA was more of a social thing for Bill. It's where he made countless friends over the years and spent the best years of his remarkable life.

"There was nothing sweeter than walking into a meeting, seeing Bill and hearing him say, 'Hi, Kid,' always with his welcoming smile," remembers fellow home-group member Leah B.

Asked once how many people he had sponsored, Bill just *pshaw-ed* and said he tried sponsoring a guy once, but he quickly went out and drank.


In reality, though, Bill sponsored all of us.

And we know that, if we stay the course, no matter what, don't drink even if, as Bill often said, "your ass is fallin' off," he'll be there waiting for us when we walk into that big meeting in the sky.

It'll be a doozy.

How does a rogue sailor, undercover scoundrel, ex-con turn into the happiest, friendliest man you ever met? The 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous is precisely how. The streets of New York City, the U.S. Navy, and a South American prison had their way with him and by the grace of God we got him.



The year was 1992 in the lobby of the Eugene Hilton Hotel, a beautiful man with a smile that wouldn't quit had a greeting for one and all. I wondered to myself, "Who is that guy?"

I want what he has – meet my friend and hero, Ed "Angel" LaRoda. He went on to the big meeting at age 94 with 43 years of sobriety. Full of life, our man about town could be seen at many local AA meetings and was a fixture at The Sunday Big Book Study Group at 10 am and the Sunday Night Speaker Meeting.

His colorful story began in New York and included both service in the Navy followed by "other work" for the U.S. government that eventually landed him in the aforementioned South American facility. It was there that Angel detoxed when his former wife could no longer get money to him for his alcohol habit.

Hitting bottom is never fun, but shaking it out in a crowded, humid prison had to be an ordeal.

Upon release Angel and his wife took a cruise ship back to Los Angeles. From hell in jail to an elegant return to life exemplifies Angel's miraculous story. A minister on that ship through the Panama Canal told dear Angel about an outfit called Alcoholics Anonymous. Angel joined up with both a physical release and a desire to stop drinking.

A spell in domestic incarceration preceded his landing in our Hilton lobby. Angel was serving what he lovingly called "this organization." For many years it was my privilege to recognize him as the most senior sobriety leader at the annual New Freedom Thanksgiving Potluck.

To call him a flirt is an understatement. The fairer sex didn't stand a chance in the presence of his tall, dark, and handsome charm. I'm so blessed to have loved this man. His heart however belonged to his long-standing love Marilyn.

My very last conversation with him went, "How's the most beautiful girl in the world today?" "Oh fine Angel," I beamed, with delight in my heart. As I walked away I heard behind me Angel say to the next lucky lady, "How's the most beautiful girl in the world?"

You see, in Angel's eyes we were ALL beautiful. Truly the beauty he saw and acknowledged so freely, was in the eye of the beholder. I now envision him out of pain in the big meeting in the sky, reunited with his pal Gus. They are both wishing all of us one more joyous day at a time.
